Gospel Meditation

Second Sunday of Advent

We like to think we are totally free, but the bitter truth is we simply are not. Or better put, our freedom is limited on every side — by governments, corporate giants, physical and mental frailties, genetic shortcomings, and even the boundaries of time and space, and above all, the burden of our sins and pending deaths. In our day, we are perhaps particularly aware that we are not free to disconnect from the technocratic rulers of the air. If you doubt me, try not paying your internet bill and see what happens. We are not totally free.

It's nothing new, of course. In Jesus' day, everyone felt the crushing weight of the Roman Empire. You can say you're free all you want. But try not paying your taxes to Rome and see what happens.

Once we feel this burden in our own lives however it comes — we are ready to hear the stunning announcement that commences Mark's gospel, "The beginning of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." It's not a simple perfunctory introduction, but a dramatic announcement of new freedom. The word "gospel" was a political, even military, term. It meant: a great victory has been won and a new king is in charge. This Jesus — not the Roman emperor — is God's son, and he has defeated all that crushes human freedom. It's time to follow him and be truly free. This week let's refuse to submit our freedom to false rulers — especially that of sin. And let's rejoice that Christ is coming to make us perfectly free from all our oppressors.

RCIA Participants Dismissal

Why are some RCIA participants dismissed in the middle of our 9:30 Mass?

For the last couple weeks you may have noticed those adults preparing to be baptized into the Catholic church are dismissed at the end of the Liturgy of the Word. This will continue each Sunday until Easter when, at the Easter Vigil, those who are ready will join us at the Table of the Eucharist for the first time. Though they cannot yet come to the table of the Eucharist, the Church has an obligation to feed those who have entered into a relationship with her through the Rite of Acceptance which we recently celebrated as a community. God's Word is their food during this period. These participants depart from the Mass with an RCIA team member to discuss the Mass readings and to experience more fully the impact of the Scriptures in their lives. It is a most fruitful and joyful experience. Please pray for them and their time spent in Dismissal!

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained can Catholics Gamble?



Question: The Bible says that Jesus condemned gambling, but I notice that so many parishes have them at festivals and other events. What's correct?

Answer: Although Jesus speaks of our relationship with material wealth and the very human struggle with greed, the gospels do not include any specific instructions related to gambling. At the same time, the Church is very sensitive to the needs of those who might struggle with an addiction to gambling, and pastoral care should always be offered to those who struggle with this reality in their life.

While it is true that many parish or school communities include gambling or games of chance in festivals and fundraisers (e.g. bingo, roulette, ring tossing, dunking booths, etc.), there is nothing inherently wrong these sorts of events, given they are played fairly and within the limits of reason are not morally objectionable. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church reminds us: "Games of chance (card games, etc.) or wagers are not in themselves contrary to justice. They become morally unacceptable when they deprive someone of what is necessary to provide for his needs and those of others" (no. 2413).

As in all things, moderation and a sense of healthy limits should be applied to gambling and games of chance. For those who find themselves living with addiction to gambling, help is available in various 12-step and addiction recovery programs.

Advent Corner

Make Room for Jesus

Fasting is a form of penance, which at first glance seems out of step in the season of hope. Yet it is the need for and the action of penance that prepares us for the coming of the Savior, who has come to save us from our sins. And He will not save us unless we first repent – acknowledge our sins and our need to be forgiven – and then manifest our repentance through acts of penance: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.

Fasting, by depriving us of worldly goods, sharpens our efforts at combating sin and acting charitably. We know that fasting and the spirit that comes with it, far from turning Advent into a shorter Lent, help us resist the temptation of reducing Advent into an extended shopping spree. From fasting, we receive the grace to gaze upon the manger instead of ritzy displays, the shepherds instead of models, the Magi instead of Macy's.

This Advent, as we add fasting to our prayer and almsgiving, may we also merit to receive the same reward, found not in a store or catalogue, but away in a manger.

Here are a few suggestions on ways to fast or abstain during Advent. Choose one or two that you can start to practice right away. May Our Lady,



Mother of Good Counsel, encourage us to deny ourselves and say "yes" to the love of God by serving our brothers and sisters with a generous heart! (Lk. 1: 38—Mary's "Yes" to God).

- 1. Eat less and receive The Most Holy Eucharist more.
- 2. Control your tongue.
- 3. Control wandering eyes.
- 4. Listen to others.
- 5. Be thankful rather than complain.
- 6. Smile, even if you don't necessarily want to.
- 7. Pray, even when you do not feel like it.




DIY Advent Calendar of Gratitude



8th Graders Read to 2nd Grade Friends


8th graders have been learning about all the different types of figurative language. Each student chose a topic and created a book to read to his or her 2nd grade buddy.



Recognize God in your Ordinary Moments The World is Pregnant

There is a character, Rose of Sharon, in John Steinbeck's Grapes of Wrath who is pregnant with her first child. As her impoverished family migrates from their native Oklahoma to California, Rose of Sharon's all-consuming preoccupation is her unborn child. Everything she eats, every drink she lets pass her lips, every action she takes — none of it is done withought for the child that is still so small as to make his mother's expectancy barely discernible to the naked eye.

"For Rose of Sharon was pregnant," wrote Steinbeck. "And the world was pregnant to her."

It is the same for us Christians in the Advent season. We can feel a change coming, and the hope of this change consumes us. It shapes our actions and our plans, we feel it in our hearts and in our souls and in our limbs. From the food we eat to the clothing we wear to the words we use, the unseen Child lives and breathes and works in every small part of this blessed season.

Even the commercial clamor that is the secular "Christmas holiday" cannot fully distract us from the holy sense of anticipation we have. We are baptized, and so it is inside of us, this voice that cries out in the desert. When we hear it, we cannot help but listen. The Virgin is pregnant, and the world is pregnant to us.

Dear Friends,

On some college campuses (and indeed among some Catholic families!), it is popular for Catholic students to host a "Liturgical New Year's Eve Party" at the beginning of the Advent Season. I think

this is a really great idea. It is a very simple way to claim what is already ours: the gift of the Liturgical Year.

You are probably familiar with the seasons of the Liturgical Year: Advent, Christmas, Ordinary Time, Lent, Easter, some more Ordinary Time...and many Solemnities (the highest level of liturgical celebration), feasts, and memorials along the way. The Liturgical Year is not just a bunch of "themes" we take note of as the weeks and months pass between the First Sunday of Advent and the Solemnity of Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. The Liturgical Year is the major way our Church invites us into the great love story that is salvation history...and it is the very context in which we discover our roles in the great drama of redemption.

As we embark on our "New Year" on the First Sunday of Advent, I want to encourage you to really live this Advent season, which invites us into the disposition of waiting and watching. Let us take heed as we hear the voice of Jesus call out, "Be watchful! Be alert!" (Mk 13:33/First Sunday of Advent). Let us wonder as we hear John the Baptist announce, "One mightier than I is coming after me" (Mk 1:7/Second Sunday of Advent), and consider what action we can take when he prompts us to "Make straight the way of the Lord" (Jn 1:23/Third Sunday of Advent). Join me in listening deeply with Mary as she hears the voice of Gabriel speak words yet unheard by human ears (Lk 1:26–38/Fourth Sunday of Advent).

I also want to call your attention to our beautiful Eucharistic Prayer Companions for the Advent and Christmas seasons, available today! Sr. Maria Miguel Wright, OP, and Sr. Anamargarita, SCTJM, prayerfully prepared these guides to help us encounter Jesus in the Eucharist and go with him on mission to share his merciful love with others. I am so excited for all of us to go deeper with Jesus together!

Our New Year has only begun! May we allow ourselves the space and time to truly enter into the mysteries of our Faith, always keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus as we encounter him in every Eucharist! "Blessed are

Parish Financials

Year-End Tax Savings: Helping YOU and Sacred Heart!

Normally, a distribution from your IRA is taxed as ordinary income, but a special IRS provision allows those who are 72 or older, to make a direct gift from your IRA to any qualifying charity, federal tax free. Your gift counts toward your required minimum distribution (RMD). You can make a gift in any amount up to \$100,000 per year to charities you support including your parish, the Archdiocese, a local Catholic school, institution or ministry, an endowment or fund at the Catholic Foundation of Northeast Kansas, or any 501(c)3 charity without paying federal income tax on the distribution.

This is an especially smart way to give to charities if you take the standard deduction rather than itemizing deductions, since gifts made this way can reduce your adjusted gross income (AGI). This can also reduce taxes on your Social Security benefits. Consult your tax advisor about

your unique situation.

- 1. To qualify the donor must be over age 72 (70½ if you reach 70½ before January 1, 2020) and required to make an IRA distribution under IRA rules. The distribution qualifies toward your annual required minimum distribution (RMD).
- 2. The IRA distribution must be a direct charitable gift and not a distribution to a donor-advised fund, a charitable remainder trust or for a charitable gift annuity.
- 3. Distributions to charity cannot exceed \$100,000 in a taxable year.
- 4. The distribution must be from your IRA, not a 401(k) or other retirement plan.
- 5. Contact your IRA custodian or representative before making a gift to arrange for the proper transfer of funds from your IRA directly to the Church and other qualified charities. The check issued from the IRA must be made payable to the charity.


- 6. If you have elected to have income tax withheld from your normal IRA distributions, advise your IRA administrator not to withhold taxes from distributions to charity.
- 7. Consult your tax advisor for the tax reporting of the special election described above.
